Blessed Teresa of Calcutta (1910-1997)

Born into a devout Catholic family in Albania, Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu entered the Irish Sisters of Loretto at 18. Where she was given the name Teresa. She was sent to Calcutta, India, in 1929 where she served as a school teacher for many years. While on retreat in September of 1946, Teresa received a "call within a call" to work among the poorest of the poor. In 1950, she founded the Missionaries of Charity, dedicated entirely to whole-hearted and free service to the poorest of the poor.

Entrance Antiphon

Look to your covenant, O Lord, and forget not the life of your poor ones for ever.
Arise, O God, and defend your cause, and forget not the cries of those who seek you.

A reading from the first book of the Kings: 19 9, 11-13

When Elijah reached Horeb, the mountain of God, he went into the cave and spent the night in it. Then he was told, 'Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord.' Then the Lord himself went by. There came a mighty wind, so strong it tore the mountains and shattered the rocks before the Lord. But the Lord was not in the wind. After the wind came an earthquake. But the Lord was not in the earthquake. After the earthquake came a fire. But the Lord was not in the fire. And after the fire there came the sound of a gentle breeze. And when Elijah heard this, he covered his face with his cloak and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave.

Scripture Note: During the reign of Ahab in Israel, Elijah took on the task of combating the Baal worship fostered by queen Jezebel however, he adopted a very militant even bloodthirsty approach. On the run for his life he takes refuge in a cave there he is taught that the tactics that he has been adopting are not God's tactics. God's ways are not man's ways God's approach is not a violent one symbolised by the mighty wind and earthquakes), rather it is a gentle one (symbolised by the breeze).

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans 9: 1-5

What I want to say is no pretence; I say it in union with Christ - it is the truth - my conscience in union with the Holy Spirit assures me of it too. What I want to say is this: my sorrow is so great, my mental anguish so endless, I would willingly be condemned and be cut off from Christ if it could help my brothers of Israel, my own flesh and blood. They were adopted as sons, they were given the glory and the covenants; the Law and the ritual were drawn up for them, and the promises were made to them. They are descended from the patriarchs and from their flesh and blood came Christ who is above all, God for ever blessed! Amen.

Scripture Note: St Paul tells of the sorrow and anguish he suffers because his fellow Jews refused to accept Christ as the Messiah. His pain is not unlike what is experienced by those who become separated from family and friends over issues of Faith and Religion. Flor McCarthy SDB

Gospel Acclamation: Alleluia, alleluia! I hope in the Lord, I trust in his word. Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew 14: 22-33

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he would send the crowds away. After sending the crowds away he went up into the hills by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, while the boat, by now far out on the lake, was battling with a heavy sea, for there was a head-wind. In the fourth watch of the night he went towards them, walking on the lake, and when the disciples saw him walking on the lake they were terrified. 'It is a ghost' they said, and cried out in fear. But at once Jesus called out to them, saying 'Courage! It is I! Do not be afraid.' It was Peter who answered. 'Lord', he said 'if it is you, tell me to come to you across the water.' 'Come' said Jesus. Then Peter got out of the boat and started walking towards Jesus across the water, but as soon as he felt the force of the wind, he took fright and began to sink. 'Lord! Save me!' he cried. Jesus put out his hand at once and held him. 'Man of little faith,' he said 'why did you doubt?' And as they got into the boat the wind dropped. The men in the boat bowed down before him and said, 'Truly, you are the Son of God.'

Scripture Note: If taken literally, the Gospel story has little or no relevance for us. Taken symbolically, however, it has great relevance for us and that seems to be how Matthew meant it to be taken. It does represent something that really did happen to the apostle. The small boat represents the infant church. The wind and the waves represent the persecutions let loose on it. Matthew tells this story to demonstrate the kind of faith that followers of Jesus must develop if they are to weather the storms that are an inevitable part of Christian life. Some people think that if we have sufficient faith life will be all plain sailing. It doesn't happen like that.

Faith doesn't shield us from the hard knocks of life and death. There can be situations where we feel weak and powerless. At such times we have to cry out to the Lord for help like the Apostles and Peter did. If we do, the Lord will uphold us. Faith doesn't save us from trials and tribulations. What it does is give the strength to cope with them. Faith assures us that we are not alone in our trials. God is with us, and his power is available to us. This story shows us the power of faith.

Cathy Dean (RSJ) RIP

Cathy was born in Bairnsdale, the third of seven children, 5 girls and 2 boys. Her parents were Eileen & Lance Dean. She attended both primary and secondary school in Bairnsdale and was taught by the Presentation Sisters. On leaving Nagle College, she trained as a Mothercraft Nurse at St Joseph’s Babies Home in Broadmeadows. She worked briefly at St Vincent’s Private and later at the East Gippsland Hospital in Bairnsdale. Cathy was a lay Missionary with the Pallotine Fathers in Tardan for two years as a House Mother to 5 -9-year-old Aboriginal girls. When she left Western Australia, she worked in the library at Nagle College before entering the Sisters of Saint Joseph. Following Novitiate in Sydney, Cathy returned to Victoria to the Broadmeadows community and studied a Diploma of Ministry at the national Pastoral Institute. Cathy lived in Altona, Werribee, Ouyen, Swan Hill, Sea Lake & Cranbourne working either in Parish or in Pastoral Care. Further study gave her a CPE qualification and a Bachelor of Social Science (Pastoral Studies) before she was missioned to Peru. In Peru Cathy spent much of her time living and working with women of the Pubelo in Pitumarca, a small community in the Andes. Together they learnt knitting and weaving and were able to improve the quality of their lives with self-development, skills, and leadership training. On her return to Australia Cathy touched many lives through her ministries at Mary MacKillop Aged Care, Hawthorn East, Footscray, Koo Wee Rup/Pakenham and Numurkah/ Shepparton. Cathy was a member of the 2019 Chapter Planning Team and a Chapter delegate. She moved back to Hawthorn East in early 2020 to take up her ministry as an elected member of the Vic-Tas Regional Leadership Team.
