Our Parish of The Immaculate Conception (also known as St Mary's) is committed to providing a safe and supportive environment for all people with special concern for children, young people and adults at risk.



After the consecration we then **remember** in a way that makes the past present.

Together we proclaim the Mystery of Faith....the Sacrament of Faith. In doing so we remember something which is past, acknowledge what God is doing here and now and look forward to something we believe God will do. 'We proclaim your death O Lord', looking back at the death of Jesus ; 'We profess your Resurrection', which is still happening, here and now; 'Until you come again' looking forward to that moment when Jesus Christ will return. In the rest of the Eucharistic Prayer, we call upon the power of Christ to intercede for the Church, for the world, for ourselves and the dead. Again, this prayer has a power that reaches beyond death and can embrace the dead. The Mass is an experience of communion of the living and the dead; of those who are in heaven and those who are still on earth; this vast community that the communion of God has created through time and space. 'Through Him, With Him and in Him, To you O God Almighty Father, all glory and honour forever and ever.' In other words, the great cry of praise. Praising God because once you have remembered and once you have seen the transforming power of God all you can do is issue into an ecstasy of praise and that's really where the great prayer concludes.

Season of Creation

September 1 to October 4

The Feast of Saint Francis of Assisi is marked throughout the Christian world and celebrates the joy of creation as well as encouraging awareness-raising initiatives to protect the natural environment.



"Listen to the Voice of Creation"

"I have heard their cry...I know their sufferings...Come, now! I will send you...I will be with you" (Ex 3: 1-12).

The burning bush is the Symbol for the Season of Creation 2022.

Today, the prevalence of unnatural fires are a sign of the devastating effects that climate change has on the most vulnerable of our planet. Creation cries out as forests crackle, animals flee, and people are forced to migrate due to the fires of injustice. On the contrary, the fire that called to Moses as he tended the flock on Mt. Horeb did not consume or destroy the bush. This flame of the Spirit revealed God's presence. This holy fire affirmed that God heard the cries of all who suffered and promised to be with us as we followed in faith to our deliverance from injustice.

"Jesus makes it clear that what corrupts a person does not come from outside but from within. If hearts are shaped by the compassion and generosity of God, they will hear the cries of the afflicted, and act. The heart here is seen as the core of human will and desire. Real disciples do God's will when they heal and protect those who suffer, despite any worldly cost or false standard. Jesus is the fulfilment of the true law that others have distorted by their greed. In taking more than we need in any sphere of life, balance is disturbed and something or someone is harmed or deprived. God desires all to have enough to live free and full lives. How do you bring God's Kingdom to birth in the world?" Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

Entrance Antiphon

Have mercy on me, O Lord, for I cry to you all the day long. O Lord, you are good and forgiving, full of mercy to all who call to you.

A reading from the book of Ecclesiasticus 3:17-20, 28-29

My son, be gentle in carrying out your business, and you will be better loved than a lavish giver. The greater you are, the more you should behave humbly, and then you will find favour with the Lord; for great though the power of the Lord is, he accepts the homage of the humble. There is no cure for the proud man's malady, since an evil growth has taken root in him. The heart of a sensible man will reflect on parables, an attentive ear is the sage's dream.

Responsorial Psalm

R. God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor.

The just shall rejoice at the presence of God, they shall exult and dance for joy. O sing to the Lord, make music to his name;

rejoice in the Lord, exult at his presence. **R.**

Father of the orphan, defender of the widow, such is God in his holy place. God gives the lonely a home to live in; he leads the prisoners forth into freedom. **R.**

You poured down, O God, a generous rain: when your people were starved you gave them new life. It was there that your people found a home, prepared in your goodness, O God, for the poor. **R.**

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews 12:18-19, 22-24

What you have come to is nothing known to the senses: not a blazing fire, or a gloom turning to total darkness, or a storm; or trumpeting thunder or the great voice speaking which made everyone that heard it beg that no more should be said to them. But what you have come to is Mount Zion and the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem where the millions of angels have gathered for the festival, with the whole Church in which everyone is a 'first-born son' and a citizen of heaven. You have come to God himself, the supreme Judge, and been placed with spirits of the saints who have been made perfect; and to Jesus, the mediator who brings a new covenant.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! Take my yoke upon you; learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart. **Alleluia!**

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 14:1, 7-14

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.' Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

Scripture Reflection:

Each Sunday we are invited to the banquet of the Eucharist, with Jesus our host and we as his guests. Privilege and rank have no meaning; differences don't count, as before God we are all equal. Every place at the feast is a place of honour. Jesus was invited to the house of a leading Pharisee and felt from the moment he arrived he was being observed. We can observe another person with friendly, hostile or indifferent eyes. Friendly eyes put us at ease and make us feel welcome. Hostile eyes mean that we are looking for faults, casting doubts on motives making us feel uncomfortable and unwelcome. Indifference means we don't care one way or another about that person. We have no concern or interest in another, almost as if they don't exist. Jesus felt hostile eyes upon him and challenged those at the feast to see that true giving occurs when nothing is expected in return. So, what eyes do we see with, in our daily lives and at the Eucharist?
