The Parish is also offering LENTEN SMALL GROUPS






EMMAUS WALKING RETREATS



Liturgy of the Word – Homily

After we have listened to the biblical readings, we have the homily. It's meant to be a proclamation of the Good News, because, if God speaks to us, it's always Good News. That doesn't mean to say it's easy news but it's Good News. The homilist has listened to the Word of God with the people and now helps the people to take that word and apply it to their real-life situation as a community and as individuals.

It's God's word that we're hungering for. The proclamation of the biblical readings means that the homily has to be not a word of the priest but the Word of God. It is an essentially liturgical moment, the homily. Not personal to the priest but the Word of God spoken to God's people and if they hear the Word of God, there will be that sense that I have heard the Good News that can sustain me in my life and even empower me for mission.

Reflection on Scripture with thoughts of a Synodal Church

- Today's readings again pose a challenge and an invitation. They urge us to act radically – to love our enemies and do good to them, to show compassion, to refrain from judging others.
- As we have been treated with mercy and compassion by our living God, so must we act towards others. The image of God's abundant mercy is eloquently described in the Gospel: in the giving in of ourselves to others, we receive God's gifts in overflowing abundance, plentiful and without measure. What would it mean to give to others, especially those with whom we don't get along, without hoping for any reward or return?
- As we strive to become a more synodal Church, how do we measure up in our dealings with other people? Do we accord them dignity and respect, especially when their views are in opposition to our?
- Could we commit to being more open to learn from others, to humbly receive new perspectives and to hear of experiences and reflections other than from our own world view?

Grant, we pray, almighty God, that, always pondering spiritual things, we may carry out in both word and deed that which is pleasing to you. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

A reading the first book of Samuel (26:2,7-9,12-13,22-23)

Saul set off and went down to the wilderness of Ziph, accompanied by three thousand men chosen from Israel to search for David in the wilderness of Ziph. So in the dark David and Abishai made their way towards the force, where they found Saul asleep inside the camp, his spear stuck in the ground beside his head, with Abner and the troops lying round him. Then Abishai said to David, 'Today God has put your enemy in your power; so now let me pin him to the ground with his own spear. Just one stroke! I will not need to strike him twice.' David answered Abishai, 'Do not kill him, for who can lift his hand against the Lord's anointed and be without guilt?' David took the spear and the pitcher of water from beside Saul's head, and they made off. No one saw, no one knew, no one woke up; they were all asleep, for a deep sleep from the Lord had fallen on them. David crossed to the other side and halted on the top of the mountain a long way off; there was a wide space between them. David then called out, 'Here is the king's spear. Let one of the soldiers come across and take it. The Lord repays everyone for his uprightness and loyalty. Today the Lord put you in my power, but I would not raise my hand against the Lord's anointed.'

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians (15:45-49)

The first man, Adam, as scripture says, became a living soul; but the last Adam has become a life-giving spirit. That is, first the one with the soul, not the spirit, and after that, the one with the spirit. The first man, being from the earth, is earthly by nature; the second man is from heaven. As this earthly man was, so are we on earth; and as the heavenly man is, so are we in heaven. And we, who have been modelled on the earthly man, will be modelled on the heavenly man.

Gospel Acclamation

I give you a new commandment; love one another as I have loved you. **Alleluia!**

A Reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (6:27-38)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I say this to you who are listening: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you. If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount. Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. 'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned. Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back.'

Scripture Notes

Saul became jealous of David's popularity and sought to kill him. David had an opportunity to kill Saul but would not do so as in his eyes Saul, as king of Israel was a sacred person, leading us to the gospel injunction to love our enemies. What distinguishes the disciples of Christ from other people, is their ability to love those outside their group and even their enemies. Jesus asks them to be compassionate, forgiving and generous towards one another, assuring the disciples that whatever they give to others will be given back to them with interest. St Paul draws a parallel between Adam and Christ. To Adam we owe the life of earth; to Christ we owe the life of heaven and our 'resurrection bodies' will be very different from the body we know now. Jesus is telling us to love, not hate. Hating expends more energy than any other emotion and is very destructive, and it may not destroy its object, but will surely destroy the one who hates. Loving one's enemies has the potential to break the endless cycle of retaliation. Sadly, Christianity has failed in this endeavour, often simply mirroring a divided society and fostering a climate where hatred could flourish. The power of love is greater than that of evil and can unleash extraordinary energies in us. If we pray for our enemies, peace will come to us, and when we love our enemies, we can be certain that divine grace dwells in us.
