

The Council's opening statement and Pope Francis' message is a powerful reminder of our call to mission:

God is asking us to refrain from putting barriers and obstacles in the way of God's mercy reaching the least, the lost and those who feel excluded, especially those who do not yet know the love of God. God is asking us to be a Church that walks together and does not leave anyone behind.

Pope Francis, Evangelii Gaudium 27

Plenary Snippet:

Two types of members. Two types of votes.

Plenary Councils are governed by Canons 439-446. At the Australian Plenary Council, the active bishops and their equivalents are deliberative members with deliberative (or decisive) votes. These votes define the outcomes of the Plenary. Other members called to the Plenary are consultative members with consultative votes. Consultative members from our Diocese are Fr Peter, Fr Denis, Lize and Katherine while Bishop Greg is a deliberative member. In relation to votes, a question that rightly concerns people is how much importance the bishops will place on the consultative vote. Looking at how the agenda has been produced may give some clues. Canon 441(4) requires the bishops to produce the agenda, but it has only been created after inviting everyone to participate in the process twice, through the Listening & Discernment and Listening & Dialogue phases. Many from our diocese joined the 220,000+ people who contributed to over 17,000 responses. The Agenda was created from listening to the voices of many, not a few. It is a hopeful beginning.

This statement affirms that "we human beings need a change of heart, mind, and behaviour". It draws from Scripture, from the theological tradition, from Catholic Social Teaching, and from the wisdom of the world, including the insights of the First Nations. The Social Justice Statement 2021-22 provides theological foundations to ground and inspire efforts to care for creation while responding to the needs of the disadvantaged and

excluded. The Statement reflects on creation in and through the Trinity; the sacramentality of all created things; the wonder and beauty available to the contemplative eye; and the need for conversion and change of life. In the Statement, the Bishops invite the whole Catholic community to join them in taking up Pope Francis' invitation to a seven-year journey towards total ecological sustainability, guided by seven Laudato Si' Goals. These Goals are: response to the cry of the earth; response to the cry of the poor; ecological economics; sustainable lifestyles; ecological spirituality; ecological education; and community engagement and participatory action. The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, 15th August Year B

Entrance Antiphon

A great sign appeared in heaven: a woman clothed with the sun, and the moon beneath her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars.

A reading from the book of the Apocalypse (Revelations) (11:19; 12:1-6, 10)

The sanctuary of God in heaven opened, and the ark of the covenant could be seen inside it. Now a great sign appeared in heaven: a woman, adorned with the sun, standing on the moon, and with the twelve stars on her head for a crown. She was pregnant, and in labour, crying aloud in the pangs of childbirth. Then a second sign appeared in the sky, a huge red dragon which had seven heads and ten horns, and each of the seven heads crowned with a coronet. Its tail dragged a third of the stars from the sky and dropped them to the earth, and the dragon stopped in front of the woman as she was having the child, so that he could eat it as soon as it was born from its mother. The woman brought a male child into the world, the son who was to rule all the nations with an iron sceptre, and the child was taken straight up to God and to his throne, while the woman escaped into the desert, where God had made a place of safety ready. Then I heard a voice shout from heaven, 'Victory and power and empire for ever have been won by our God, and all authority for his Christ.'

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Corinthians (15:20-26)

Christ has been raised from the dead, the first-fruits of all who have fallen asleep. Death came through one man and in the same way the resurrection of the dead has come through one man. Just as all men die in Adam, so all men will be brought to life in Christ; but all of them in their proper order; Christ as the first-fruits and then, after the coming of Christ, those who belong to him. After that will come the end, when he hands over the kingdom to God the Father, having done away with every sovereignty, authority and power. For he must be king until he has put all his enemies under his feet and the last of the enemies to be destroyed is death, for everything is to be put under his feet.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia!

Mary is taken up to heaven, and the angels of God shout for joy. Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (1:39-56)

Mary set out and went as quickly as she could to a town in the hill country of Judah. She went into Zechariah's house and greeted Elizabeth. Now as soon as Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the child leapt in her womb and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit. She gave a loud cry and said, 'Of all women you are the most blessed, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. Why should I be honoured with a visit from the mother of my Lord? For the moment your greeting reached my ears, the child in my womb leapt for joy. Yes, blessed is she who believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled. And Mary said: 'My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord and my spirit exults in God my saviour; because he has looked upon his lowly handmaid. Yes, from this day forward all generations will call me blessed, for the Almighty has done great things for me. Holy is his name, and his mercy reaches from age to age for those who fear him. He has shown the power of his arm, he has routed the proud of heart. He has pulled down princes from their thrones and exalted the lowly. The hungry he has filled with good things, the rich sent empty away. He has come to the help of Israel his servant, mindful of his mercy- according to the promise he made to our ancestors—of his mercy to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.' Mary stayed with Elizabeth about three months and then went back home.

Scripture Notes

Psychologists today trace everything back to childhood, so when things go wrong there is a tendency to blame one's parents. Mary was with Jesus from the very beginning and stayed with him right up to his last moments. She was beside him in all the joyful and sorrowful times in his life. She brought him into the world in a stable and as a newborn fled to Egypt with Joseph to escape Herod's killers. She sought him in sorrow when he got lost in the Temple and during his public ministry she sometimes feared for his safety and sanity. She accompanied him all the way to Calvary staying with him right to the end. This feast is to celebrate her sharing in his risen glory. It gives us great encouragement too. Mary was just a human like us and what she has attained all of us are meant to attain.

As our spiritual mother, fragile and mortal as we are, she wants nothing less for us. She is a model of faith and fidelity. Her life was characterised by a loving service of God and of her neighbour. It is because of where she is now, with God, that she can help us.
