Refugee Week Sunday 19th June - Saturday 25th June 'HEALING'




- Pews at an angle, or back to the perpendicular as before.

THE MASS SERIES – by Archbishop Mark Coleridge of the Archdiocese of Brisbane

Every 2 weeks we will, share with you each part of the Mass.

The Creed: Once we have heard the Word of God, we stand and recite the Creed together.

This is our way of saying "Yes, we believe the Word that we have heard; we put our trust in the

God who has spoken to us." There are two Creeds we use: the **Creed of the Council of Nicea**, in 325AD, so the words are very old. The second is the **Apostles' Creed**, also known as the baptismal creed used in the Church of Rome in the early centuries. They are similar in the sense that they say, we believe in God Father, Son and Spirit. We are saying yes again to the Trinity; to the Communion of God here and now; to the God who has called us into His own life; who speaks to our heart. We are saying yes to that God, in words that are very old, but which are always new. Some of the words are strange: in the Council of Nicea's Creed it says, "Jesus is consubstantial with the Father". It just means that He is united perfectly to the Father. In the Apostles' Creed it says that Jesus "descended into hell", meaning that He goes into the dark world of the dead and floods that world with the light of Easter. At its heart the Creed, is the same in every age and every place.

It is God's people saying yes to the God who speaks and yes to the word that we've heard here and now.

Entrance Antiphon

O God, who in this wonderful Sacrament have left us a memorial of your Passion, grant us, we pray, so to revere the sacred mysteries of your Body and Blood that we may always experience in ourselves the fruits of your redemption. A reading from the Book of Genesis 14:18-20

Melchizedek King of Salem brought bread and wine; he was a priest of God Most High. He pronounced this blessing: 'Blessed be Abraham by God Most High, creator of heaven and earth, and blessed be God Most High for handing over your enemies to you.' And Abraham gave him a tithe of everything.

Responsorial Psalm

R. You are a priest for ever, in the line of Melchizedek.

The Lord's revelation to my Master: 'Sit on my right: I will put your foes beneath your feet.' **R.**

The Lord will send from Zion your sceptre of power: rule in the midst of all your foes. **R.**

A prince from the day of your birth on the holy mountains; from the womb before the daybreak I begot you. **R.**

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians 11:23-26

This is what I received from the Lord, and in turn passed on to you: that on the same night that he was betrayed, the Lord Jesus took some bread, and thanked God for it and broke it, and he said, 'This is my body, which is for you; do this as a memorial of me.' In the same way he took the cup after supper, and said, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this as a memorial of me.' Until the Lord comes, therefore, every time you eat this bread and drink this cup, you are proclaiming his death.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the living bread from heaven, says the Lord. whoever eats this bread will live for ever.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 9:11-17

Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing. It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected, they filled twelve baskets.

Scripture Notes

People often don't have a sense of community - of being the Body of Christ. They come to church and leave again without meeting anyone. Whatever they take away, it won't be from one another, nor will they give to one another. Why does this happen? Partly because of lack of community participation in the Eucharist, a hangover from the Latin mass. This is not the way it is meant to be. Loneliness is a major issue today and the Eucharist can be both a great help and a challenge. The Eucharist is a sign and source of our unity, without it there is no people of God, no community of faith, no Church. We can't be truly be in communion with Jesus without being in communion with one another. Building community is not that hard- it just takes friendliness and rising above shyness, coldness and indifference. It's not easy being a Christian in today's world, but it is almost impossible on one's own. The fruits of community are bonding, sharing and togetherness. By inviting us to take part in the Eucharist, Jesus makes us his companions and friends, as we should be to each other, When we depart from church, we must take out into the world some of the warmth that we have experienced there.
